NINETEEN CARS ON C. N. R. TRAIN OFF

Wreck Near St. Catharines is Worst in Years; Crew Escape

Hamilton. March 31 (CP).— Nineteen cars of a Canadian National Railways freight train were derailed early today in one of the worst wrecks to occur in this district for several years. No one was injured.

Derailment took place at a culvert over 15-mile creek near Peachland between Jordan Station and St. Catharines. The embankment is 50 feet high at this spot.

Traffic in both directions was blocked, and train schedules thrown into confusion.

One car landed in the creek and only the top and about two feet of one side is showing. Eight other cars are lying on the side of the hill. The remainder are strewn on both sides of the tracks.

The last car derailed was only three cars from the caboose in which the train crew was riding and the men escaped injury. The locomotive also remained on the track.

Wrecking crews were rushed to the scene from Hamilton. They are being assisted in the task of clearing the tracks by section crews from Grimsby, Beamsville, Winona, St. Catharines, Niagara Falls and other nearby points
