## 2 BRITISH M.P.'S SAY CENSORS HALT KOREAN REPORTS

London, Nov. 11—(UPI)—Two members of parliament today questioned the workings of United Nations censorship in Korea. They gave notice they will ask War Secretary Anthony Head about it in the House of Commons.

Labor member Tom Driford will ask if Head "will effort to ensure prompter and full publication of information about the progress of Korean truce talks."

Driford added there have been recent delays in release of reports of British troop actions, and will ask Head to "press for Commonwealth representation in the censorship in Eighth Army headquarters in Korea."

Conservative Richard Thompson also will urge Head to press for Commonwealth representation in censorship.

The war office disclosed last Monday that it had ordered an investigation into alleged anti-British bias by U.S. Eighth Army censors. Prime Minister Churchill sharply rejected today a Laborite demand that British Commonwealth forces remain entirely on the defensive during the truce talks. "His Majesty's government have complete confidence in the U.N. commander in his conduct of operations in Korea," Churchill said in the Commons.

Laborite C. A. B. Wilcock demanded Churchill "make representations" to Gen. Ridgway no Commonwealth troops would not be used in any attack. "No," Churchill said.

## 'WESTERN HEAD DENIES S.C.M. 'IRON CURTAIN'

## C.N.R. TRAINS COLLIDE NEAR SEVERN BRIDGE BRAKEMAN IS MISSING

Severn Bridge, Nov. 16—Two men were killed, one is missing and six were injured here last night when a northbound C.N.R. freight train collided head-on with a work train and boxcars.

Dead are Clarence Huston, 44, of Alderwood, conductor of the freight train; and Robert H. Reeve, 24, of Cedarbrae, fireman on the work train.

Jack Brown, 26, of Gravenhurst, brakeman on the freight train, is missing.

### Three in Hospital

Injured and in Soldiers' Memorial hospital at Orillia are: Romeo Moreau, 27, brakeman on the work train, Long Branch; Freeman Bumstead, 26, engineer of the work train, Parry Sound; and Kenneth Mann, 26, engineer of the freight train, Toronto.

Minor injuries were received by E. Fitzgerald, J. Fraser both of the work train and V. C. Lambert, freight train, Barrie. Only one crewman escaped unscathed. He was Victor Baker, Mimico, a brakeman on the southbound freight.

With a roar like thunder, the heavy southbound freight plowed into the northbound work train. The locomotives reared into the air and boxcars telescoped along the right-of-way.

Seven loaded boxcars "leap-frogged" right over the tangled wreckage of the locomotives and strewed wood, steel and freight for a quarter of a mile.

Neither engineer had time to apply the brakes as the trains rounded a bend on the narrow rock-enclosed single track.

C.N.R. officials said the accident was caused by the failure of the southbound freight to pull into a siding at Kaste, a few miles north of the accident.

Train orders to the freight crew, when they left Gravenhurst at 9:15 p.m., were that they were to "make a meet" at the Kaste siding and to remain standing until the work train had passed before proceeding south to where a "meet" would be made with the Northland.

Twenty-five minutes after the freight left Gravenhurst the collision occurred. Engineer Kenneth Mann, an ex-R.C.A.F. gunner, joined the C.N.R. in 1937 and was booked out as a "special engineer" for alternate freight and passenger hauls.

"Did we make an error?" he asked today from his hospital bed. "It's too terrible to think of . . . that men are dead, and others

mangled . . . and I am helpless now to do anything. There is always, in every job a man does, the awful element of human error."

Mann had his hand on the throttle, peering into the night with Huston, Brown and Lambert also in the cab. "As we slowed down from 80 miles an hour to about 30 miles an hour to take a curve I could see what looked like the reflection of lights ahead of me," related Mann. "At first I thought the lights were the headlights of a car, because there were a few crossroads in the area."

"Suddenly I knew it was another train . . . on the same track . . . coming right at us."

Lambert was thrown clear, and landed in a stretch of swamp. He shook himself free, raced across, held and hauled a passing motorist to spread the alarm.

Freeman Bumstead, married and father of two children, lay with his face, scalp and part of his shoulder swathed in bandages in hospital.

## DEFEND SOUDAN UNTIL OUR GOV'T IS FORMED—EDEN

London, Nov. 15—(UPI)—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden said in Commons today that Britain will ensure the defense and security of the Soudan area in Africa, claimed by Egypt, until it is ready for self-government.

He added that a constitution providing for self-government may be in operation in the Soudan by the end of next year. Then, he said, it will be up to the Soudanese people to determine freely whether they want to be allied with Egypt or with Britain.
