DIG IN MUD, DRAG RIVER THREE SOLDIERS SEEKING TWO TRAINMEN MISSING IN N.B. WRECK

BELIEVE ENGINEER, TRAINMAN SWEPT AWAY BY SURGING ST. JOHN RIVER AFTER LOCOMOTIVE, SIX CARS DERAILED B

DIVERS HAVE FAILED TO LOCATE the bodies of two trainmen killed near Woodstock, N.B., when a landslide hurled the locomotive and six cars of a CPR freight train into the swirling St. John river, seen here, B. K. McNally, the engineer, and D. C. Keich, both of Aroostook Falls, N.B., died in the wreck. The accident occurred as the train of

17 loaded cars was running from McAdam to Aroostook. The landslide apparently slev along a 35-foot frontage at a curve, shortly before the train reached the spot. McAally ar have been trapped in cab of locomotive and possibly swept away by surging river. Fireman
