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Fireman of Six Others

WENT INTO CONNECTICUT RIVER FROM CENTRAL VERMONT RAILWAY TRACK.

East Putpey, Vi., March 31.-One man is believed to have been drownware ed and the lives of six others imperilled yesterday when an engine and a caboose on the Central Vermont Railroad fell into the Connectieut River, two miles north of here. Willis Perrict, aged 22, a fireman, whose home is in Winchesdon, Mass., has been missing since the accident. and is believed to have lost his life. An embankment weakened by recent floods gave way under

pressure of the locomotive. With Perritt in the engine Engineer time of the accident were A. E. Littlefield, of Brattleboro, and Cornelius Driscoll, of Athol, Mass., a

student fireman. All were carried un-der water, but Littlefield and Bris-coll succeeded in getting free of the

engine and swam ashore. Four men in the caboose climbed out of windows and waded to safety. None was injured.

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Engine of Excursion Train Jumped The Track Yesterday Afternoon on Chambly-Montreal Branch of . the Central Vermont. Passengers Were Taking Advantage of Free Trip Given by Real Estate Agents Heartrending Scenes Were Witnessed. Many Were Pinned Under the Trucks.

Montreal, April 14.—Six persons are dead and from ten to fifteen injured as the result of the decilment of an exemplon train resterday afternoon on the Montreal-Chambly branch of the Central Vermont Hallway about four and a half miles out of St. Lambert. The train, which was one carrying about 700 passengers who had taken advantage of the free trip given by Coptrell, Limited, real estate agents, to prospective purchasers of their lots at Albeno subdivision, was returning to Montreal at a speed of between twenty-five and thirty miles an hour, when on striking a spread rall the engine and the three first coaches left the rails a few hundred wards the other side of the Sunlight City subdivision, near East Greenfield station.

The engine was runn ng tender first, es there had been no means of turning it before starting the return trip. When the derailment occurred, the tender jumped to the right side of the track, turning bottom up, while the engine fell on its side abross the track. The engineer and firetion were both thrown from their cab, the fireman receiving injuries from which he glied soon after, while the engineer cocaped with some painful bruises. The three coaches which were derailed re-mained upright on their trucks, but the impinging of their ends caused most of the fatalities. The first d annous the track nearly

ing crew arrived with the appliances necessary for effective rescue work.

The line where the accident occurredhas been operated by the Central Vermont for a number of years, but has been in process of electrification for the purpose of being taken over by the Montreal and Southern Counties Rail-The poles and wires are already in position, and the change of me operation was to have taken effect this week. The old 56 pound ralls have been retained, and although some new tles had been put in many of the old partially decayed ones are still in place.

ANOTHER TO DEATH LIST.

Montreal, April 14 (Specia) An other name was added to the death list this morning in the accident to the C. C. Cottrell special real estate advertising train, which was wrecked yesterday afternoon on the Montreal-Chambly branch of the Central mont. Welter Strange, of 2234 Esplanade avenue, who died this morning, is the latest victim of the awing wreck which hurled seven into eternity and injured twenty others, some very seriously.

Their efforts were fruitless in the case of some of the victims, whose bodies were so firmly wedged in the shattered remains of the coaches that they were only released after hours of work by the wrecking crew.
